By law, the state of Kentucky requires all newborns to receive eye ointment within 1 hour of birth and a Vitamin K injection used to prevent bleeding because babies have a low Vitamin K level at birth. You will be asked if you wish your baby to receive the Hepatitis B vaccine. Talk with your pediatrician about when is the best time to start the Hepatitis B vaccine.

Your baby may remain with you at all times on the Mother/Baby unit.
